THE HOTEL

WE HAVE NOW sold out of all Non-Smoking Double Rooms and Family Rooms in the Royal Albion Hotel. If you require a Double Room, we suggest you book the Ramada Brighton and, if you let us know, we can put you on a waiting list for any cancellations at the Royal Albion.

If you are a single person or two friends attending, there are still some Twin Rooms (two single beds) remaining in the convention hotel. There are also a number of Double, Twin and Triple Smoking Rooms available.

All available rooms at the Radisson Blu Hotel are also sold out. If you would like to be placed on a waiting list for cancellations, please contact *hotels@whc2010.org*.

If you have a reservation but find you will not be able to join us for the convention, please e-mail as soon as possible to cancel your reservation.

Our special rates are only available to book until January 24, 2010. Please keep this in mind when planning your visit with us. All hotel rates quoted are per room (up to two persons occupancy) and include Full English breakfast and all taxes.

Please note: Advertised rates are *only* available for registered members of the convention. If you are not a member of the convention yet, or attempt to book the hotels directly, you will *not* receive our special discounts. Convention attendees are responsible for settling their own account with the hotel of their choice. You can pay by cash in full or register your credit card upon arrival.

Room cancellations must be made by 2:00 p.m. (UK time) on March 20, 2010. After that time, no-shows will be charged 100% of the first night and any subsequent bookings will be cancelled. FLYING TO BRIGHTON

MANY OF YOU will now be starting to think about your travel plans to Brighton. One of the reasons we chose Brighton was its direct travel links and close proximity to London.

If you are flying from overseas, you'll likely be flying in to Heathrow or Gatwick.

Upon arrival at Heathrow, follow signs to the Underground. The Piccadilly line (dark blue on the maps) stops at all terminals. Either purchase a ticket there or else pick up a Oyster travelcard (oyster.tfl.gov.uk/oyster/entry.do) and take the tube to Green Park. There change onto the Victoria Line (light blue on the map) and travel one stop south to Victoria Station. Catch a Southern train (www.southernrailway.com) to Brighton. Trains run about every half-hour with a journey time of 50 minutes. First Capital Connect also run trains from London Bridge, which connects to the Northern (black) tube line (www.firstcapitalconnect.com) . There are four an hour with an average journey of just over an hour. You can also get a First Capital Connect train to Brighton from St. Pancras International, with a direct link from Eurostar.

A more expensive option is a coach directly from Heathrow to Gatwick, and a number of companies offer this option on the web.

If you fly into Gatwick, you're almost at Brighton already. A train from the South Terminal takes you into Brighton Station in just over half-an-hour. Once you arrive at the station, walk down Queen's Road opposite the exit towards the sea. When you arrive at King's Road, directly on the seafront, turn left for the Royal Albion and Radisson Blu hotels (they are opposite the Pier), or right for the Ramada Brighton. It should take you no more than 10-20 minutes, or you can pick up a cab from the rank outside the station.

LES EDWARDS

Artist Guest of Honour



LES EDWARDS was born in 1949 in Walthamstow, East London. He began his illustration career immediately upon leaving the notorious Hornsey College of Art in 1972. In the vears that followed he became a stalwart of the UK illustration scene, acknowledged for both his versatility

and his professionalism. He has worked for all the major UK publishing houses and for many in the US, and his work has also encompassed advertising, gaming, record and CD covers, and movie posters.

He has illustrated two graphic novels based on stories by Clive Barker-Son of Celluloid, about an ambulatory cancer, and Rawhead Rex, which tells of the adventures of a baby-eating monster and has absolutely no connection to his own views on children. Both books were critically acclaimed.

Although best-known for his fantasy and horror images, he has worked in multiple genres and still seeks to do as wide a variety of work as possible. His paintings are to be found in private collections in both Europe and the US.

While he began his career working in gouache, Les swiftly abandoned this medium in favour of oil paint, which he found to be both more flexible and subtle. He applies the paint to a smooth, gessoed board and uses various media to aid rapid drying. He does not use an airbrush-an instrument that he describes as "the work of the devil". There is a good deal of

preparatory work involved in the form of drawing, not only to establish a composition but, also to define character, if that is necessary. His fascination with the human figure and portraiture clearly permeates all his work and he pursues this interest with regular attendance at a life class. Les seeks to create pictures with an immediate eye-catching impact, often eschewing the ever more elaborate style of some of his contemporaries in favour of simpler, more direct images. This is an approach emphasised by his formal compositional sense.


In recent years Les has also taken to painting under the pseudonym "Edward Miller" in order to do a different kind of work and use a more romantic style. This work has also become popular, and Les now pursues both careers with equal enthusiasm.

In 1995 he was Artist Guest of Honour at the World Science Fiction Convention. He has been voted Best Artist by the British Fantasy Society on seven occasions, and has been nominated in that category every year since 1994. He has been nominated for the World Fantasy Award for Best Artist five times (his alter-ego, Edward Miller, won it in 2008). He has also been nominated for five Chesley Awards.

born in Northern Ireland in 1955. He first discovered the fiction of H.P. Lovecraft when he came across 'The Lurking Fear' in a 1960s issue of The Magazine of Horror. He was hooked for life and has since become one of the most acclaimed and

respected illustrators of the author's work. It was in the pages of that same digest magazine that he first saw the artwork of Virgil Finlay and his personal favourite, Lee Brown Coye.

As a teenager, his artistic training amounted to a single afternoon of art class at school per week. However, Dave resolved to teach himself whatever he needed to know. Living in a house that was never short of books, he would climb up into the attic where an eccentric uncle would store all types of old volumes bundled up in brown paper and tied with string. The budding artist used the flyleaf page of many an old encyclopaedia to draw upon.

It was not until 1978 that he began to take a more serious approach to his illustration work, developing his use of the pen and ink stipple technique. The following year he discovered The British Fantasy Society and soon he was being published in such magazines as Fantasy Tales, Whispers, Weirdbook, Nyctalops, Kadath, Fantasy Book, Ghosts and Scholars, Dark Horizons, Fear, Skeleton Crew, Interzone, Imagine, White Dwarf and many others.

Dave's iconic 1979 poster 'H.P. Lovecraft



1890-1937' is still selling to this day and was even reproduced in Fortean Times and The Observer's Review supplement to accompany a book review about Lovecraft. A further 100copy print, 'H.P. Lovecraft Centenary 1890-1990' appeared in 1989. In 1981 he produced Lovecraft's Pantheon, a portfolio limited to just 100 numbered copies signed by the artist and Brian Lumley, who contributed the Introduction. Masters of Nightmare: A Portfolio was issued in a 300-copy edition in 1983 with an Introduction by Lumley and an Afterword by Karl Edward Wagner.

Dave also co-edited (with Stephen Jones) and illustrated H.P. Lovecraft's Book of Horror, and his artwork was featured in the documentary film The Eldritch Influence: The Life, Vision and Phenomena of H.P. Lovecraft.

Having re-designed and sculpted the statuette himself in the early 1980s, Dave Carson has received the British Fantasy Award for Best Artist on five occasions.





HUGH LAMB

Editor Guest of Honour

HUGH LAMB was born in 1946 in Sutton, Surrey. One of Britain's most acclaimed anthologists of ghosts and gaslight terrors, he is renowned for unearthing many obscure tales by Victorian and Edwardian writers, including a lost M.R. James story for his 1975 compilation *The Thrill of Horror: 22 Terrifying Tales.*

His first anthology, A Tide of Terror: An Anthology of Rare Horror Stories, appeared in 1972. Since then, his books have included Victorian Tales of Terror, A Wave of Fear, two

volumes of The Star Book of Horror, Terror By Gaslight (1975), The Taste of Fear, Return from the Grave, Victorian Nightmares, Cold Fear: New Tales of Terror, Forgotten Tales of Terror, The Man-Wolf and Other Horrors, Tales from a Gaslit Graveyard, New Tales of Terror, Stories in the Dark. Terror By



Gaslight (1992), two volumes of Gaslit Nightmares, and A Bottomless Grave and Other Victorian Tales of Terror.

More recently, Dover Publications has been reprinting new and omnibus editions of his anthologies, including *Tales from a Gas-Lit Graveyard*, *Gaslit Nightmares* and *Gaslit Horror*.

Hugh has also compiled individual collections by such authors of the macabre as Erckmann-Chatrian, E. Nesbit, Bernard Capes and Robert W. Chambers.



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PROGRAMMING


The **Pitch Black Rights Fair** will kick things off at noon on Thursday and Programming and Readings will begin at 2:00pm, with the **Official Opening Ceremony** at 6:00pm.

Programming will continue throughout the Friday and Saturday and will run until 4:00pm on Sunday, when we will have the **Closing Ceremonies**. It will be followed by the alwayspopular **Dead Dog Party**, which will run for the rest of the evening. Along with talks and panels on all aspects of horror and related genres, we will have **Interviews** with our Guests of Honour, **Signing Sessions** throughout the weekend, and **Launch Parties** for an exciting range of new titles debuting at the Convention.

We will also be running a number of onehour **Kaffeeklatsches** in the Radisson Blu. This will give a maximum of ten people (five from the UK and five from overseas) the opportunity to participate in a relaxed conversation with their favourite author or editor over coffee. On the Friday evening from 7:00-9:00pm there will be a **Mass Signing** where book collectors and fans will be able to catch up with their favourite authors and get their treasures signed.

On Friday and Saturday evenings, our incomparable compère, Reggie Oliver, will be presenting live entertainment as part of The Phantom Gaslight Music Hall.



READING CAFE

IN BRIGHTON we will be reviving our popular Reading Café—which was such a success at the 2007 event in Toronto—to complement our regular Programming Schedule.

We will be promoting individual readings (including our Author Guests of Honour), multi-author readings, and small-press book debuts. There will also be time set aside exclusively for poets to present their work.

If you wish to read from your work at the convention, simply click on the link on the website and remember to include your name, credits, contact information and any other details that you think may be pertinent.

GHOST WALK

FOR THOSE ATTENDEES who are looking for something a little bit different or interested in exploring the darker history of Brighton, we have arranged an exclusive **Ghost Walk of the Lanes**–Brighton's Most Haunted Quarter.

Conducted by actor and storyteller Rob Marks in the guise of Silas the Ghost Hunter, attired in full Victorian costume, Ghost Walk of the Lanes is more of a street theatre event than a mere guided walk. Silas will take you on a tour of seven haunted sites, telling eight ghostly tales associated with them.

All the stories are from well-documented sources, although the walk is, essentially, light-



hearted fun and suitable for all ages. The walk covers a relatively short distance and lasts approximately 70 minutes. It costs just £5.00 for adults or £2.00 for children. There is no need to book in advance–just meet up in the lobby of the Royal Albion Hotel at 7:00 P.M. on either Thursday March 25 or Sunday March 28 and look for Silas!

Your guide will be easily identifiable, manifesting himself in a black Victorian frock coat, top hat and Gladstone bag. Fear notdespite his sinister appearance, he is quite friendly.

PITCH BLACK Rights Fair

IT IS COMMON at World Horror Convention to have Pitch Sessions, usually involving just two or three editors or agents. In keeping with our avowed intent to run a professional and groundbreaking event, World Horror Convention 2010 in Brighton is doing things a bit differently.

Pitch Black will be Europe's-first ever Genre Rights Fair, in which publishers, agents and creators will come together to pitch new ideas, look for the next Big Thing and sell foreign and other rights to existing works. Imagine a mini-Frankfurt or London Book Fair dedicated to horror publishing (okay, we'll also let you talk about fantasy, science fiction and dark crime if you feel you have to...!).

For the first time at a dedicated event, the international publishing industry will have the opportunity to specifically sell and buy genre book rights in both the English language and translation. With literally hundreds of established and new authors attending the convention from all over the world, this is a perfect opportunity for publishers to find the next Big Genre Writer or for agents to buy or sell the next Genre Best-seller.

The event will also be open to registered authors and anthology editors, who will be asked to fill out an online form with their contact details, along with a synopsis of the work they are offering and their insights into why editors, publishers or agents should buy or represent them.

Pitch Black will be held from Noon until 5:00 pm on Thursday, March 25 in The Royal Albion Hotel's Bar Rogue. Individual 4ft tables are available free to print publishers and literary agents who want to participate. All we ask is that each table has a minimum of one fully paidup member of the convention. You can bring down as many other staff members as you wish, although they will not be able to access the rest of the convention without a membership. Tables are limited and will be allocated on a first-come basis. If you require a second table space, they are available for £35.00.

Throughout the event there will be a full bar open in the immediate area also serving coffee and snacks. There is also a more informal area for meetings and follow-up discussions, along with an outdoor balcony area overlooking the Brighton Pier and the historic beachfront.



HWA BRAM STOKER Awards banquet


